The new decade is shaping up to be a good one for the Liberty Corner Fire Company as 1990 has already seen the arrival of a new chief, the announcement of the first Firefighter of the Year award and the near completion of a new station on Church Street, Basking Ridge.

After eight years on the department, Richard Schiavoni, 26, has been elected as the new chief of the company.

"It's an accomplishment I've been striving for," Schiavoni said. Schiavoni, who replaced Steve Pe-

erson at the company's top position, aid he was surprised to find out how different the responsibilities of a chief are compared to the duties of other

lepartment members.

'One day you're taking orders and on Jan. 1, you're giving orders," Schiavoni said. "My responsibilities hange on the fire scene, like deciding whether we need additional manpowr depending on the area. With newer aws and compliances, manpower is of he utmost importance.'

Peterson is now serving as the first issistant chief under Schiavoni.

While Schiavoni is scheduled to be hief for two years, he would have to vait a full year after his term expires refore being able to hold the post

"It gives you a chance to get more urrent schooling," Schiavoni said.
'If you want to be chief, you have to

rove yourself."

That's just what Schiavoni has done luring the past eight years as he noved through the ranks working as a irefighter, driver, foreman, second asistant chief and first assistant chief.

Unlike some departments, the Librty Corner Fire Company does not lave lieutenants and captains which nakes the path to becoming chief ougher than usual.

"You go right from firefighter to as-istant chief," Schiavoni said. Firefighter Of The Year

One of Schiavoni's first decisions as he new chief was implementing the irefighter of the Year award for the nember who worked the most hours utside his required volunteer time.

"It was my idea to keep track of the ours the guys worked above and beond what is expected of them, chiavoni said. "There are a lot of uys who put a lot of time in, then get urnt out and we lose an asset to the ire company. We needed some type of acentive program."

The program seemed to have vorked on this year's winner Chris vederas, who worked more than 250

xtra hours.

"I just thought he deserved it," chiavoni said. "He saved the fire

of things in house."

According to Schiavoni, one way Kvederas helped out the department was by servicing many of the company's trucks on his own.

"Everytime a truck goes out for service it costs at least \$500," Schiavo-

Kverderas, 25, is the foreman of engine 4102. He said he joined the company three years ago, following in the footsteps of his younger brother, Brian. His father, Tom, has also been a member of the Liberty Corner First Aid Squad for 10 years.

"These guys are like a second family," he said of the company. "We work hard but have a good time together. The guys are right there for you if you need them."

Professionally a driver for UPS, the lifelong resident of Mountain Road said he spends between 25 and 40 hours working for the company.

But Kvederas isn't the only dedicated firefighter on the company. Schiavoni said each of the department's 42 members deserves credit for volunteering their time for the benefit of the town.

They do it out of the goodness of their hearts," said Schiavoni, referring to the common misconception that the firefighters are paid employees.

Schiavoni added that is one reason why he is excited about the completion of the 14,800-square-foot fire station under construction on Church Street. He said the \$2 million facility, which should be ready for the firefighters by July or August, will make the volunteer job a bit more desirable.

They need some place nice to go," Schiavoni said.

The construction of the structure has not sat well with local residents, some of whom have questioned the need for such a large facility.

Schiavoni said although the new station may at first seem like an intrusion, it is a necessity in providing safety and fire protection to the community's increasing population.

"With The Hills coming in, we ne a facility like this to protect the toy properly," Schiavoni said. "As far I'm concerned, it is more than enough

for the next 50 to 75 years. Obviou I'm biased, but we bought the proerty 50 years ago for the sole intent building a new facility when the ne

The Hills Development Company planning to build 1,893 resident units and a 27-hole golf course 1,166 acres in Liberty Corner.

Currently, there are 42 members the company but Schiavoni said on about 25 are active since many of the remaining 17 are older and can't assi on fires as much as they would like.

"Hopefully with this firehouse we grow in membership as well," Schivoni said. "We've already built in the growth in the fire company into the new building.'

He added that the new station wi also give the firefighters the room t once again hold community benefit like pancake breakfasts and spaghet dinners.

"It's a real nice time," Schiavor. said. "You see a lot of people in the town."

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
